JA VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

TRADITIONAL IN-CLASSROOM



- JA volunteers commit to teaching a certain number of sessions in the classroom
- Elementary school grades: 5 to 6 sessions
- Middle school grades: 6 to 7 sessions
- High school grades: 5 to 12 sessions
- JA staff prepares the volunteers before the program
- Teachers assist volunteers at the school and in the classroom

JA-IN-A-DAY



- A high-impact way to deliver JA's lessons for a particular grade level all on the same day (4-5 hours)
- Volunteers from the same organization or company conduct the lessons in assigned classrooms
- Teachers are present in the classroom at all times to partner with the volunteers, help maintain discipline, and answer any questions
- Perfect for volunteers who can only take one day off work

JA EDUCATION CENTER



- A one-day commitment approximately 7 hours
- Teachers deliver several weeks of classroom lessons and then students attend a JA Education Center for a day-long immersive experience
- Volunteers work hands-on with a group of 6-8 students in a simulated city experience at *JA BizTown* or *JA Finance Park*
- Volunteers use teachable moments to encourage students to complete tasks throughout the day
- · Volunteers keep students on-task by following posted instructions given by JA staff
